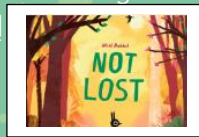

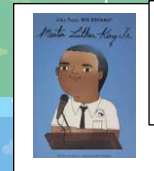
## NEWS AND UPDATES: Reading Assemblies
