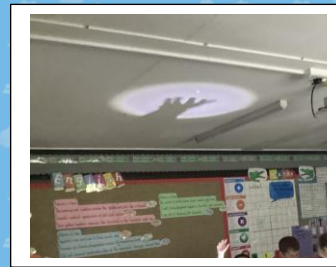


NEWS AND UPDATES:

A valiant effort from these Year 4 mathematicians yesterday, who competed in a maths challenge event at Lucton School. Out of 24 competing pairs, we finished a respectable 7th and 11th. It really was a challenge for all competitors – an hour and a half of solid maths, involving number, shape and a range of complex puzzles – but our pupils took it in their stride and were so enthusiastic about the whole experience. As is so often the case, they were a massive credit to the school and Themselves and we are immensely proud of them.



This week, Year 3 have been learning about how shadows are formed. They discussed the difference between transparent, translucent and opaque objects. The children then investigated which type of object would create the best shadow. They discovered the most defined and darkest shadows were formed when a light source (in this case the torch was aimed at an opaque object).
