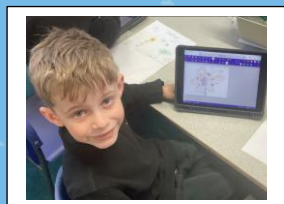
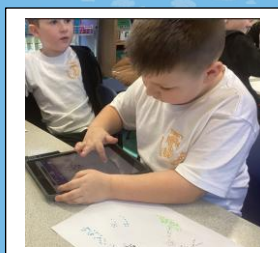


NEWS AND UPDATES:
