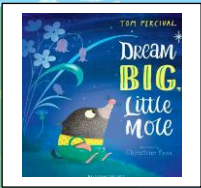

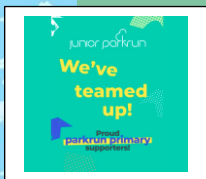

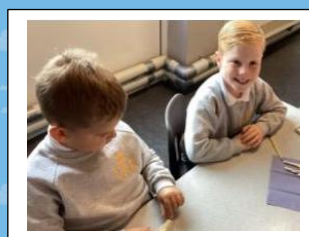


NEWS AND UPDATES:
